History & High Tech Merge in Metal

Nestled in the heart of Virginia, just a few miles south of the geographic center of the state, lies the historic community of Appomattox. One of the most important locations in American history, Appomattox is arguably the most familiar place in all of Civil War history.

Nearly 150 years ago, on Palm Sunday, April 9, 1865, this nation's deadliest war ended at the Appomattox Court House when Confederate General Robert E. Lee surrendered his army to Union General Ulysses S. Grant. But this moment was just as much a beginning as it was an end.

While history is important, Appomattox has an eye on the future as well. With companies like Craneworks Inc., Virginia MetalFab/StallWorks LLC, Quality Pattern Works, and now TriTech Solutions of Virginia, Appomattox has several metal-based firms growing in a high-tech way.

In late 2012, three young entrepreneurs resurrected an old textile manufacturing building, turning it into a high-tech metal shop. These career metal fabricators quickly grew TriTech's client list to include conveyor manufacturers, food processors, packaging companies and the nuclear industry firms, just to name a few.

TriTech recently purchased a state-of-the-art five-axis water-jet metal cutter. Most metal fabricators use three-axis jet cutters that can cut materials along length, width and height axis, but then a

separate tool is used to create a beveled edge. TriTech's new machine can do all the needed sculpting at once, maximizing efficiency by cutting down on time spent per job. More clients can now be served, and new clients will mean more employees for TriTech.

resources crucial to the success of your business, and Virginia is one of those places.


